I recommend approval of the attached Curriculum Proposal #12-13-07 from the College of Liberal Arts, Department of Language and Literature.

This proposal adds a new required course to both the English and English Education programs, ENGL 2250, Introduction to Literary Studies. The new course will function as a gateway course for new majors, providing them with the basic theoretical and reflective framework to succeed in the program.

The proposal deletes ENGL 4490, Capstone, from the B.A. in English.

The proposal also decreases the number of hours for the B.A. in English to 120 hours as mandated by the HEPC and reflects the new general studies program.

This proposal also decreases the credit hour requirement for the B.A. in English Education from 146-147 to 121 hours. (121 hours is typographical error. It should read 126 hours.)

This proposal will not result in any gain of hours for the English major because we are removing ENGL 4490, Capstone, and adding ENGL 2251, Introduction to Literary Study. It does reduce the number of hours for the B.A. in English to 120.

This proposal would add 3 required hours to the curriculum for English Education students, as mandated by the West Virginia Department of Education after their review of our curriculum assessment report.

III. RATIONALE FOR THE PROPOSAL.

A. Quantitative Assessment: Indicate the types of assessment data, i.e., surveys, interviews, capstone courses, projects, licensure exams, nationally-normed tests, locally developed measurements, accreditation reports, etc., that were collected and analyzed to determine that curricular changes were warranted. Quantitative data is preferred.

Our most recent program curriculum revision included a portfolio and regular intellectual self-evaluation papers as new requirements for majors, requirements that we have also now included in our program assessment plan. We have not yet seen a cultural change in our majors that properly reflects these programmatic changes. ENGL 2250 would help us to meet these requirements. Comparable programs have an introduction to literary studies. Please see Appendix£.

The English B.A. program at present has two senior-level assessment courses, the Senior Seminar (ENGL 4400) and the Capstone course (ENGL 4490). Both courses require significant literary research and writing. Offering both these senior-level courses every year strains our faculty resources and duplicates the same type of assessment (a long research paper). Instead, we believe that the addition of an Introduction to Literary Studies for both English B.A. and English Education majors would allow us to position students for greater success while taking their advanced literature survey courses, and would involve students in our departmental assessment from the beginning of their careers with us.

The WV Department of Education has mandated that we add an introductory course to the English Education program so that English Education majors in order to standardize our assessment program. This is also a concern for the English BA program, and the same course could help to better prepare students in both programs.

APPENDIX E: Comparable Programs

University of Pittsburgh

Englit 0500-W, Introduction to Critical Reading

The aim of ENGLIT 0500 is to introduce students to several key practices of literary study and criticism. Students undertake intensive close readings of typically three to four primary literary texts selected from a range of literary forms or with diverse historical interests, styles, and commitments. They also read various critical and theoretical arguments about the course texts and significant issues in literary study and closely examine the methods and aspirations of different modes of reading and writing about literature. The writing and revision of course essays challenge students to articulate and reflect upon their own positions and to situate them in relation to other arguments and investments. The sequence of assignments is designed to give students focused practice in a variety of modes of literary analysis. The course's range and variety of texts and approaches highlights the essentially heterogeneous nature of literature and literary critical methodologies. The writing and readings of the course prepare students for advanced work in literary studies.

Because this course is the first required in the sequence for English majors, one or two sections each term are reserved for majors. All sections of the course prepare students for the upper-level period survey courses and the Junior Seminar.

Earlham College

ENG 302 INTRODUCTION TO THE STUDY OF LITERATURE (4 credits)

An introduction to the formal study of literature focusing on reading, interpretation and criticism of texts from various genres in the British and American literary tradition. Prerequisite: An Earlham Seminar, an Interpretive Practices course or consent of the instructor. (CP)

Indiana University

L202: Literary Interpretation. Required for both the minor and the major, L202 ensures that majors in the writing track are conversant in basic issues of literary interpretation. Prerequisite: English W131 or other successful fulfillment of first-year composition requirement. (3 hours)

L371: Critical Practices. Required for the major, L371's aim of granting "study... and practice in using contemporary critical methodologies" enhances student skill and sophistication in the analysis and appreciation of language. Prerequisite: English L202. This course may wisely be deferred until several 300-level courses have been completed. (3 hours)
