I recommend approval of the attached Curriculum Proposal #12-13-09 from the College of Liberal Arts, Department of Language and Literature.

This proposal reduces the total credit hours to 120 hours for the B.A. in Spanish and the B.A. in Education with the Specialization in Spanish.

This proposal makes SPAN 3350 (History of the Spanish Language) an elective rather than a requirement for the B.A. in Spanish and the Spanish concentration in the B.A. in Education. It also makes Span 4431 (Methods: Second Language Acquisition in the Classroom) an elective in the B.A. in Spanish.

Finally, it removes the clause "offered on demand" from several course descriptions.

The American Council on Teaching Foreign Languages (ACFTL) recommends that all advanced undergraduate language students demonstrate an understanding of historical linguistics. This "best practices" recommendation can be met with SPAN 3350 as an elective rather than a requirement. The course will still be available to our students and equip them to pursue careers in teaching and other areas that require Spanish.

Revising the course descriptions will put these courses in line with the human and financial resources of our department, which is too small to offer elective courses literally "on demand."
