#### III. RATIONALE FOR THE PROPOSAL.

A. The new courses have been developed in order for the French minor to contribute most productively to other programs of study, such as English, history, political science, national security and intelligence, psychology, sociology, and fine arts. The topics also reflect current developments and research areas in the fields of language learning and cultural studies. The program has been offering cultural studies courses in English as a gateway to language learning in a trial FREN 1199 situation for four years, and the results, in terms of student engagement, have been positive enough to warrant a permanent course that reflects this success (FREN 4420 Francophone Cultures of the Americas). The Media Studies focus of FREN 3326 represents experience with students at FSU since 2006, learning what can be successful in upper-level courses taught in French on this campus. This experience was gained through FREN 3310, 3311, 3312, 3314, 3321, 4411, and 4426, where students gave regular feedback in class discussion, and through ongoing assessment of the French program.

#### Course Description FREN 3326: Media Studies in French

This upper-level course is taught in French to increase proficiency in language and culture. Students examine main currents in media from the Francophone world, building historical and contemporary contexts of interpretation. The coursework is structured for students to develop a comparative study of a particular topic and related ideas expressed through media in different countries. Suitable for French minors and those with previous experience in French. See instructor for questions regarding placement in the course.

#### Course Description FREN 4420: Francophone Cultures of the Americas

Students work to understand the cultural and social context of regions of North and South America and the Caribbean where French is spoken, through a study of creative productions from these regions, such as film, music, and storytelling. The course provides a frame of reference to build meaningful relationships with and within Francophone communities in the Americas. Suitable for students in a wide variety of majors, and for students with no previous French experience. Taught in English.
