So far, we have fourteen students who are eager to participate. A special topics course would also provide us with a logical way to transfer that study back here as academic credit. Special topics courses would also help prepare students for longer periods of study in Italy.

Course Outcomes and Assessment Measures

Italian 1199 – Elementary Conversation and Composition

Upon successful completion of this course students will be able to:

1. Communicate effectively and with fluidity, using basic conversational skills

Direct Assessment Measure: Participation in Weekly Discussions and Homework

2. Write a well-structured composition using effectively the present and past tense and demonstrate an understanding of the different uses for both the present and past tense.

Direct Assessment Measure: Dialogues – Four (4) in class dialogues will be created by students at week 3, 6, 9 and 12 in class based on contemporary cultural topics in Italy presented prior to the weekly lesson.

3. Write descriptions about oneself and others as well as descriptions of cities and cultural aspects, such as films.

Direct Assessment Measure: Film Discussion Group - Students will be required to view the film *Cinema Paradiso* and prepare a brief response in class in small groups to key questions regarding the film/characters.

4. Identify idiomatic expressions and regional idioms.

Direct Assessment Measure: Final Project – Students will prepare a final project in pairs. This project will be student initiated and may include any topic covered in class during the semester. Each pair will submit the final topic by week 12.

Italian 2299 – Italian Culture and Civilization from Antiquity to Present

Upon successful completion of this course students will be able to:

1. Identify and correctly place each of the Italian regions and their capitals.

Direct Assessment Measure: Quiz

2. Explain the importance of the Roman Empire and the Catholic Church in the development of the Italian culture and political structure today.

Direct Assessment Measure: Exam

3. Identify the many artistic currents that were born an Italy and how they influenced both Italian culture and modern western culture.

Direct Assessment Measures: Discussion Questions, Oral Report and Handout, and Exams

4. Critically analyze Italian literature, such as Dante, Petrarca, Macchiavelli and properly identify how each depicts different aspects of Italian culture.

Direct Assessment Measures: Exams, Presentation Proposal and Final Presentation

Italian 3399 – Italian Immigration, its Literature and the American Dream

Upon successful completion of this course students will be able to:

1. Discuss the social and political conditions that pushed Italian to immigrate to the Americas.

Direct Assessment Measure: Seminar Participation

2. Explain the reasons for Italian settlement in both the United States and Argentina.

Direct Assessment Measure: Quizzes

3. Analyze different literature and properly place them within the appropriate historical context.

Direct Assessment Measure: Presentations

4. Critically analyze how the concept of the American dream influenced and shaped Italian immigration patterns and how that changed both Italy and the diaspora of Italian peoples.
