APPENDIX: Catalog course descriptions:

FOLK 3301 Material Culture......3 hrs (Same as MUSM 3301)

A study of the tangible evidence of civilization, including through the perspective of Appalachian culture. Material culture is presented within the context of folk life and traditional craftsmanship, including crafts, arts, traditional foodways, clothing, tools and technology. Students examine material folk culture from various methodological and theoretical perspectives, including artifact analysis and fieldwork.

MUSM 330 Material Culture......3 hrs (Same as FOLK 3301)

A study of the tangible evidence of civilization, including through the perspective of Appalachian culture. Material culture is presented within the context of folk life and traditional craaftsmanship, including crafts, arts, traditional foodways, clothing, tools and technology. Students examine material folk culture from various methodological and theoretical perspectives, including artifact analysis and fieldwork

MUSM 2150 Folk Arts......3 hrs (Same as FOLK 2150)

This studio course is designed to give students a hands-on learning approach to the historical understanding and making of traditional /historical folk arts. Various materials will be used including fiber, wood, metal, paper, natural materials and more to explore such traditional arts as weaving, carving, quilting, metalwork, marbling/book arts, doll making, and other folk art and craft forms. The course includes research projects on the cultural context, history, and techniques of specific folk arts. Emphasis is given to the application of folk art making skills in museum interpretation.
