Courses for the BA in Spanish, and both the Elementary and Secondary Specializations in Spanish are all very similar. The major difference is that Education majors take SPAN 4431: Methods of Second Language Acquisition and the Education majors take only a 3 credit elective, while BA majors take 6 credits of electives.

III. RATIONALE FOR THE PROPOSAL.

A. Quantitative Assessment: Indicate the types of assessment data, i.e., surveys, interviews, capstone courses, projects, licensure exams, nationally-normed tests, locally developed measurements, accreditation reports, etc., that were collected and analyzed to determine that curricular changes were warranted. The shortage of World Language teachers throughout West Virginia is well documented. At the beginning of this school year, 11 language teaching positions throughout the state were unfilled. And that does not take into account the number of classrooms where permanent substitutes with no language credentials attempt to teach language by showing videos.

Anecdotal evidence from the School of Education suggests that a pool of Teacher Candidates in the Elementary Education program who come to college with a strong background in Spanish would be willing to complete a specialization in Spanish in addition to their Elementary Education specialization, allowing them to teach younger students Spanish at a period in their development when these students are most easily able to learn a second language.

By streamlining our course offerings in Spanish, both Elementary and Secondary teaching majors should be able to add a Spanish specialization to their education program and still graduate within 120 hours. Thus, this curriculum proposal would serve the state of West Virginia well by training qualified instructors to fill numerous vacant positions.

Though this proposal was originally conceived to meet the need for language teachers across our state, it quickly became evident that streamlining the Spanish BA could benefit the students from many disciplines currently taking Spanish, such as Business, Psychology, Criminal Justice, National Security and Intelligence, and Nursing. By reducing the number of electives required, and encouraging qualified students to test into the Intermediate level of the language, students in many majors could realistically add Spanish as a second major to their existing degree, and boost their employability.

The new courses (SPAN 4410 and 4411) are necessary to make sure that our graduates can perform at the nationally recognized ACTFL standard of Advanced Low for undergraduate language major graduates. This will help us keep the quality of our program high even though students take fewer courses. It also prepares teaching candidates for their licensure test, PRAXIS 5195 **Spanish: World Language.**
