2. **New Minor:** Police Academy Minor in the Criminal Justice program.

3. **New Certificate:** West Virginia Law Enforcement Officer Basic Police Training certificate evidencing completion of all training requirements necessary for employment as a West Virginia Law Enforcement officer for (a) Criminal Justice majors who choose an Academy Concentration, (b) non-degree seeking students who complete the Academy Curriculum, and (c) Fairmont State students who complete the requirements for the Academy.

Courses or credits will not be added, however requirements for students in the Academy Concentration will change. Students in the general criminal justice program currently take 30 credit hours of required Criminal Justice (CRIM) courses, 15 semester hours of CRIM electives, and 21 semester hours of Social/Behavioral Science courses for a total of 66 credits in the major. In addition to the 30 hours of Core Curriculum courses, students must complete 27 hours of Free Electives.

Academy Concentration students will instead complete 47 hours of required CRIM courses, 15 hours of Focused Electives in CRIM, thus limiting the choices for electives, and 15 hours of Social/Behavioral Science courses (see Appendix A).

The additional requirements are Crim 2202—Criminal Law (3 hours), Crim 4411--Academy Internship (12 hours) and Crim 4401—Independent Study (3 hours).

We are not revising any course content at this time.

CRIM 2202, CRIM 4401, and CRIM 4411 will be required courses in the Police Academy Concentration.

Additionally, the Registrar will be asked to designate a section of Crim 4411 as Academy Internship and a section of Crim 4401 as Academy Independent Study, similar to how Honors courses are now designated with each having a restriction of instructor approval. The internship and independent study credits will be earned through completion of the Academy curriculum. The requirements and assessment measures of Crim 4401, and Crim 4411 will not change. Each course will have a restriction of instructor approval. Instructor approval will be subject to Police Academy requirements of completion of a formal application process including an interview and advisor recommendation and satisfactory completion of a selection process that includes a criminal history background check, a complete medical examination including a drug screen, and pass a physical fitness test for admission into the academy program.

New courses will not be created. Sections of existing courses Crim 4401 and Crim 4411 will be designated as Academy sections, similar to how Honors courses are now designated, with instructor approval as a restriction.

The courses by Academy instructors include content required by the Law Enforcement Professional Standards Subcommittee of the WV Governor's Committee on Crime, Delinquency and Corrections. The academy will be organized and operated pursuant to WV Legislative Rule Title 149 Series 2 (149CSR2).

Implementation of the academy will initially be supported by budget supplied by the university to prepare facilities and purchase equipment. Academy students will then pay a fee to attend on top of their normal tuition that will cover the labor and operating costs associated with these activities. This budget will exist separately from funds currently associated with the Bachelor of Criminal Justice. Overall, it is expected that the academy will serve to attract additional students to the university by increasing the value of completing a Fairmont degree for some students.

Police Academy Minor in the Criminal Justice Program

Students majoring in any discipline may complete a Police Academy Minor. Students earning this minor will complete a total of 21 hours as follows:

Criminal Justice 2202—Criminal Law (3 hours)

Criminal Justice 3340—Criminal Procedure (3 hours)

Criminal Justice 4401A—Academy Independent Study (3 hours)

Criminal Justice 4411A—Academy Internship (12 hours)

Admission into Crim 4401A and Crim 4411A to will have a restriction of instructor approval. Instructor Approval will be subject to Police Academy requirements of completion of a formal application process including an interview and advisor recommendation and satisfactory completion of a selection process that includes a criminal history background check, a complete medical examination including a drug screen, and pass a physical fitness test for admission into the academy program.

Appendix D **Basis Training in Law Enforcement Certificate Program**

Description

Graduates of the program will meet all training requirements for certification as a West Virginia Law Enforcement officer. Job opportunities will include local law enforcement agencies and statewide law enforcement agencies. In addition other states and federal agencies may also accept graduation from a law enforcement training program as meeting full or partial requirements for certification in their respective locations.

Degree Requirements

The Academy is an intensive 16 week program that will require full instructional days as well as most evenings Monday through Friday. Students must be prepared to dedicate themselves to the program and must understand that time will not exist for work or social activities other than weekends. Residence in campus housing (Academy Barracks) will be required during the program or a portion thereof. Attendance issues will result in dismissal from the program.

Required Certificate Courses (15 credit hours for degree seeking students)

Criminal Justice Students majors may earn this certificate through completion of the Academy Concentration of the Criminal Justice B.S. curriculum and the Law Enforcement Training Academy curriculum as determined by Academy officials. Criminal Justice students will earn 15 hours college credit hours during the Academy through Crim 4411A-Internship (12 hours) and Crim 4401A- Independent Study (3 hours). Fairmont State students from disciplines other than Criminal Justice may earn this certificate by completion of the Police Academy minor and the Law Enforcement Training Academy curriculum as determined by Academy officials.

Non- degree seeking students must be admitted to Fairmont State and to the Academy and will be required to complete the Law Enforcement Training Academy curriculum as determined by Academy officials.
